



The Hopewell Project 2006 Nakuru, Kenya



Hopewell High School Nakuru, Kenya): (Taken from excerpts from Hopewell Director Vitalice Kahendah) "The situation in Kenya and in many African countries is that families pay for their kids in high schools. The cheapest government schools, where kids come and go back home in the evenings, with no lunch provided, charge a termly fee of approximately Kenya Shillings 6000/=(US\$84). In Kenya, about 60% of the population of 30 million people live on less than a single dollar per day. At present we have 760 boys and girls. They learn in makeshift classrooms made of iron sheets with no doors or windows. We have dirt floors, although some are packed with stones/gravel to lessen the effect of dust especially during the current dry spell. At present, each of the teachers receives about Kshs. 2,800/=(US\$40), thanks to the effort of the Sponsor a Teacher Program.



Replacing iron walls and stone floors with permanent masonry for students to learn in \$4500/room

Installing a water treatment plant and adding the facilities to double the water storage providing clean water for the school and community (est. pop. 45,000). \$12,000
